

Since first coming into the public eye in ITV's 2011 series 'The Dales', Amanda began documenting the fascinating story of her farming life, before publishing two best-selling books 'The Yorkshire Shepherdess' and 'A Year in the Life of the Yorkshire Shepherdess'. In 2018 Amanda and her family featured in a Channel 5 series, 'Our Yorkshire Farm'.

Ant Middleton is best known for his role as Chief Instructor on Channel 4's hit TV show, 'SAS: Who Dares Wins'. He has become a much-loved and admired master of survival and endurance on- and off-screen, spurred by his formidable career in the UK's elite forces, including the Marines, 9 Parachute Squadron and SBS.

His book 'First Man In: Leading From The Front' was published by HarperNonFiction and reached No. 1 on The Sunday Times Best Seller List. In 2018 Ant was filmed for a Channel 4 documentary climbing Mount Everest, an adventure which tested him further than ever before.

Ian Robertson is a former BBC Rugby Commentator and Former Scotland International. He joined the BBC in 1972 and, after covering some of the greatest matches around the world for 47 years, finally hung up his microphone in 2018 and retired.

Some of Ian's most iconic on-air moments include Scotland winning the Grand Slams in 1984, against France, and in 1990, against England, plus Jonny Wilkinson dropping the World Cup goal in 2004. He has appeared regularly on BBC TV and has been the Rugby Correspondent for The Sunday Times. He has also written 30 books including the autobiographies of Bill Beaumont, Andy Irvine and Gareth Edwards.

Alison Weir is the biggest-selling female historian in the United Kingdom. She has published twenty-three titles and sold more than 2.7 million books. She has written extensively about the Tudor period, focusing in particular on Henry VIII and the lives of his six wives.

For this event Alison will be joined by fellow historian, Siobhan Clarke, to present a lecture based on their book 'A Tudor Christmas'. Siobhan is a Guide Lecturer for Historic Royal Palaces and her second book, 'The Tudors' was published in 2019 by Carlton Books.

Michael Portillo

Michael Portillo worked for the Conservative Party between 1976 and 1983 and entered the House of Commons in 1984. He was a minister for eleven years and had three positions in the Cabinet, including Secretary of State for Defence.

He lost his seat at the 1997 election and began to develop a career in the media. He returned to the Commons between 2000 and 2005, was shadow Chancellor, and contested the leadership of the party in 2001, unsuccessfully. Since leaving politics, Michael has devoted himself to writing and broadcasting.

The group is committed to creating new music, and has commissioned leading British composers including Cheryl Frances-Hoad, Gabriel Jackson, Cecilia McDowall, and Matthew Martin.

Candice Brown won *The Great British Bake Off* in 2016 and, two years later, took part in ITV's *Dancing on Ice*. She started her professional life as a secondary school PE teacher but has since left the world of schools to pursue a career in baking and cooking.

Since her *Bake Off* victory, Candice has become a regular columnist for the Sunday Times *Dish* magazine, has baked on *This Morning* and has appeared as a panellist on *Loose Women*. She released her first cookery book *Comfort* in 2017 which includes a wide range of easy to make, 'no nonsense' recipes for all occasions.
